

# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

As some of you may already be aware we have a new Chair and Vice Chair of the Parish Council, when at the recent Annual Parish Council Meeting (APCM) Cllr Mubasshir Ajaz and Cllr Craig Champion being unopposed were duly elected as the respective Chair and Vice Chair. We should recognise and thank Cllrs Malcolm Newing and Greg Noble for undertaking these roles over the past year.

It has been most pleasing to see a familiar face back in Stoke Hammond and the return of a Police Community Support Officer having seen our last PCSO leave some months ago. Welcome back Tina Hobson who was this areas PCSO for many years until being moved to another region some while ago. Tina has already been doing the rounds and popped along to community events such as the weekly coffee morning to reacquaint herself with residents. As is usual planning updates can be found in the relevant section elsewhere in this publication, but once again the land at the far end of Brook Farm Close merits a specific mention. In the last PC News, we detailed as to how an application for 42 new homes (22/00613/APP) had been 'Called In' before the North Bucks Development Control Planning Committee meeting who were sympathetic to the arguments raised by the Parish Council and local residents and as such voted to refuse the application. This refusal led to an almost instant and obviously preprepared new application (24/00850/CPE) for a Certificate of Lawfulness in relation to the originally approved but now expired application for 33 homes to the same site, by trying to suggest with supporting photographs and other material matters that some work on the site under this original application had already been undertaken within the 3-year time frame and thus the application was still valid and not expired. Well, the planners did not agree and have refused the Certificate. In their refusal and whilst they acknowledged that some minor trench/foundation digging works had indeed been undertaken within the 3-year time period, this was in fact unlawful. Under a condition of the original approval the developers were required to submit a surface water and sewerage plan before commencing any works, and they had failed to do so before undertaking these trench works, hence the reason for deeming it unlawful and the refusal. So, what now, well one suspects the developers will appeal against one or both of the refusals, or put in a new planning application. Ultimately, it's pretty certain some development will take place on this site, but by then and all being well our evolving Neighbourhood Plan should then be in place which both the developers and planning will have to take into consideration.

Still on the subject of new developments, the Parish Council were recently invited by the Hills Group to view prior to its opening the new play park that sits by Murphy Lane and Roman Field the new estate off Fenny Road. It is certainly very impressive (as you can see from the front cover photographs), and not just the play equipment itself but also the amount of green space that surrounds it. In part the reason for the large area of green space was a dictate of planning in recognition that Roman artifacts were found on this land, hence the road name Roman Field. Murphy Lane also has local relevance, as this was named after the late Pam Murphy who once resided at the nearby Tyrells Manor House.

The layby on the Stoke Road, has been issue for a long time now, with all saying something needs to be done. In order to indeed try and get something 'done' your PC

organised in May a site meeting with all interested parties, which included representatives from the Canal & River Trust, Bucks Highways. Anglian Water, the Epic Boating Company (we'll explain more in a moment about their presence). The Old Dairy Farm whose caravan and camping facility abuts the canal at the layby location, plus your PC Clerk and 3 of your Parish Councillors. It did seem rather coincidental that the large stack of pallets that had been in the layby for some weeks had literally the night before been set alight so come our meeting all that remained was a pile of ashes. As to the meeting itself, it was generally agreed that a full closure of the layby by Highways and the Canal & River Trust enforcing the rule that moorings should be on the opposite to the layby side towpath, would ultimately be the only real solution. However, the Highways representative felt the cost of doing same would be prohibitively too expensive and unlikely to be approved, but the question would be raised with at head office. There is though another possible solution, and this is where the Epic Boating Company who are Stoke Hammond based comes into the equation, as they have submitted a plan to purchase the layby and its associated canal side land from Highways and operate a managed marina on the site complete with associated facilities and as such there would be a full control of boats that can moor and vehicles that are permitted to enter and stay on the site. So, at the moment it seems we are in the hands of Highways, as regards official closure or selling of the layby site. The Parish Council have deemed it only fair to await an official response from Highways, but if not forthcoming or positive it will escalate the matter as the current situation with this layby can and should not continue.

You can find the latest results from our 3 MVAS (Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs) in the latter pages of this edition, but some of your Parish Councillors form part of the Speedwatch team, and could recently been seen on what turned out to be an unseasonal cold day, on the grass verge by Mount Pleasant, sat in their folding chairs, adorned in high vis vests with notepads, pens and speed radar gun ready to target those entering Stoke Hammond from the Leighton Buzzard direction. In all some 162 vehicles passed from 2 - 4pm of which 16 were recorded as speeding above the 30mph limit and those were reported to Thames Valley Police. In point of fact the number of vehicles exceeding 30mph was far greater but because of the rules dictating Speedwatch and how it operates, you are only allowed to record and report those travelling at 36mph and above.

There have been two PC Meetings including the APCM held since the last PC News and other than items already covered, here are some of the main points from those two meetings:

PC Meeting held on the evening of Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> April at the Newton Leys Pavilion attended by all 7 Councillors, Clerk and 18 members of the public (MoP).

• There was quite a lengthy discussion regarding two planning applications namely the already mentioned Certificate of Lawfulness for Brook Farm and the Willowbridge Marina, the latter to which ultimately albeit not unanimous the PC had no objection – see planning updates for more details.

• Clr Champion put forward the proposal that the PC would adopt the responsibilities of the Newton Leys Management Company on the 31<sup>st</sup> July 2024 on the basis that the following conditions are met:

• Man Co asks all members to pay all outstanding arrears plus £1000 to adopt, however, this will be reduced to all outstanding arrears plus £100 if it is paid in full by 31st May 2024.

• Man Co will agree to transfer all cash held by Man Co on 31st July 2024 after payment of all existing known debts, excluding the sum of £10,000 which will be retained by Man Co to fund the closure of the company.

• Man Co will transfer the benefit of the restrictions over any dwellings where the full amount owed has not been repaid in full by 31st July 2024.

• Man Co will arrange for the transfer of the public open space and park to the PC. The PC will be responsible for its own conveyancing fees.

• Man Co will arrange a park safety inspection with ROSPA prior to handover and attend to any areas of outstanding maintenance.

• Man Co will supply a document to all members that have fully paid by 31st July 2024 allowing the restriction on their property to be removed.

• At least 70% of the current outstanding service charge arrears are paid and at least 70% of the £100 payments are made prior to the adoption.

• At a previous PC meeting it had been agreed that a more formal process for the naming of new roads in the Parish was required. Cllr Newing presented what was a revised process to that previously suggested which was accepted and agreed by the PC, and would involve the following steps:

Step 1 - As soon as the road layout is known the Parish Council to consider possible names including those of residents who have passed away.

Step 2 - As soon as the request for names comes in from Bucks Council, letter A is sent to the family.

Step 3 - If a positive response is received, the street name suggestion is sent to Bucks Council.

Step 4 - On receipt of confirmation from Bucks Council, letter B is sent to the family.

Step 5 - On completion of the site an official naming ceremony is held with the family members in attendance.

As for the APC Meeting held on the evening of Tue 7<sup>th</sup> May, this was preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting, whereby local organisations as well as the PC gave reports on their last years activities. These organisations included the likes of the Gardening Club, the Scouts, St Luke's Church, the Community Centre and Ladies that Lunch. The APCM which started at just after the normal 7.30pm time was joined by 12 MoP.

• Under Highways, Footpaths & Footways and Lighting matters Cllr Venn confirmed the bridge behind the church has at last been repaired and the pathway by Tyrells Manor has been widened and the brambles cleared. Highways have promised to repair the pathway along Fenny Road near Scotts Close. The new sign along Stoke Road advertising Southlands Auto Centre has been reported via Fix my Street to establish whether the owners have permission for it to be on display. It was proposed by Cllr Champion and agreed by the PC to make contact with Bucks Highways to find out if they would be willing to sell the land on the right as you enter the village from the Bletchley end (Old School Lane) with a view to change this into a parking area and install EV chargers for residents of the village to use.

• During the agenda item on any Parish Improvements and Enhancements the Clerk confirmed the 3 x dog waste bins have been installed in Newton Leys South and a large broken tree limb has been removed on Bragenham Side. Cllr Champion has been approached by 2 residents asking for one of the bins to be moved and he proposed that the PC agree to the costs for doing this. Cllr Venn seconded, but all other Cllrs were against, so the motion was denied. The Clerk was also asked to chase Highways regarding the proposed locations of the grit bins in Newton Leys South. Cllr Champion also advised that

he had recently walked the village with a resident looking at the drains, with the view to the PC possibly paying to have them cleared due to the time it is taking Bucks Council to do anything about them. However, Bucks Council have advised that the PC are not allowed to touch the drains, and we will need to be patient and wait for them to clear them.

• In the closing Public Participation session, a MoP mentioned that there is confusion amongst residents regarding the Neighbourhood Plan and S106 money and that there is not enough transparency around how the money will be used and for the benefit to the community. Cllr Newing explained the importance of the Neighbourhood Plan and the benefits it will bring to the community, and Cllr Champion advised that he will be working with local community groups to make sure the S106 money is spent wisely.

The next PC Meeting is scheduled for the evening of Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> June starting at 7.30pm in the Community Centre, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB. It will the same venue for the July meeting to be held on the evening of Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> July with the usual start time of 7.30pm.



## Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys South Neighbourhood Plan Update

We completed a significant milestone on the 11<sup>th</sup> April with the end of the Regulation 14 Consultation on our draft Neighbourhood Plan, with Parishioners, Site Owners, developers and Statutory Bodies all invited to provide feedback.

*I'm pleased to say that we received 47 feedback forms with 38 received from Parishioners.* 

Of the Parishioners 81.6 percent supported the plan whilst providing a range of comments on the specific details. All comments received can now be viewed on the Parish Council Facebook page but with names and personal details removed for data integrity purposes.

Of the 18.4% who did not support the plan 6 did so because they objected to the inclusion of the Parish Council Land behind the Community Centre and one because of the inclusion of the land South of Newton Leys. The specific reason raised by some was the concern that the Parish Council would be removing the playground area without replacing it.

If the land behind the Community Centre was ever subject to a housing application, this would only be because the benefits arising from the application would provide for substantially better community facilities and/or truly affordable housing, that would be specifically for young/old parishioners. Any such proposal would be put separately and in detail to the local community and would only go ahead with their blessing. We would also ensure that there would be continuity in providing playaround facilities in the nearby vicinity before embarking on any development. The purpose of including the Parish Council land in the plan is that it keeps the opportunity alive, whilst the S106 project develops the overall plan for improving sports and recreational facilities within the Parish, to match the growth in residents over the past 10 vears.

The feedback received has been reviewed by the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and a number of changes made to the draft plan. As part of this process the group concluded that the Site Allocations remain valid, recognising that whilst in total there were objections to the inclusion of the Parish Council land and the land south of Newton Leys there were far more giving both a high priority for inclusion in the March 2023 prioritisation process. The team felt that the site allocation reasoning was not well understood and we will endeavour to improve communication with respect to this policy element as we move on with the NP timetable.

#### **Next Stages**

**1**. The Parish Council will be asked to agree to the amended version of the Plan at the June Parish Council meeting.

The document will be submitted to Bucks Council.
 Once Bucks are happy the Plan is aligned with national guidance and the AVDC/Bucks Local plan they will issue it for the Regulation 16 week consultation. They will advertise the consultation through normal Bucks Council channels. They will notify directly all those that responded to the recent consultation and all the statutory consultees again. At this stage feedback will go directly to Bucks Council planning.

4. Bucks will appoint a Planning Examiner and provide him with the plan and any comments received during the Reg 16 Consultation. It will be his job to determine if the plan meets the Basic Conditions, namely the plan is aligned with National and Local Policy, and other requirements set out by Law. He will determine if modifications are required and will recommend whether it can move forward or not to a referendum.

5. If the Plan passes inspection and is deemed fit for purpose, it will be submitted by Bucks to Parishioners in a local referendum. If 50% of parishioners who vote support the plan it will become part of the Local Plan Policy specifically for development applications within the Stoke Hammond Parish area. I cannot stress enough the importance of completing this project and getting it right. Once the plan is accepted by Bucks formally as a document, it will carry significant weight in the Planning Process, it will mean we have a greater element of control over how the Parish grows in the future. In a few weeks' time we will have a new Government and all parties will be giving a significant focus on meeting the shortfall in housing delivery. We need to be ready for whatever this focus brings.

I very much appreciate all those people who have taken part in the process to date. It is my intention to respond personally to all parishioners who commented during the recent consultation.



Aylesbury drug dealer sent to prison

Following an investigation by Thames Valley Police, an Aylesbury drug dealer has been jailed.

Usman Raja, aged 23, of Crown Leys, Aylesbury, was jailed for five years and six months at Aylesbury Crown Court on Tuesday (21/5).

Raja pleaded guilty to one count of possession with intent to supply Class A drugs, namely cocaine, and possession of criminal property.

Just before midday on Thursday 18 April this year, Raja was subject to a drug search by police officers in Parton Road.

During the search an amount of cocaine was seized from Raja's vehicle as well as an amount of cash and a mobile phone.

Raja was arrested at the scene and was charged with the offences the following day.

Investigating officer, PC Gary Ratcliffe said: "This is another case that demonstrates Thames Valley Police's commitment to taking drugs off our streets.

"Our message is clear, if you are a drug dealer you will be arrested, charged and jailed.

"At the time of his arrest, Usman Raja was on prison licence for previous drugs offences, and so the court handed down a significant sentence.

"We need to work with our residents to take drugs off our streets. Therefore, if you suspect drug dealing in your community, contact us by calling 101 or leaving any information you have via our website."







### The Music Room - by William Fiennes

This was a well written memoir and almost an essay about the Author's childhood living in a rambling house cum- castle in the Cotswolds with his family. This eldest brother, Richard, suffered from epilepsy and was the main focus of his family and as a rather demanding character also had a large impact on the Author's young life. There is not really an actual plot but despite the indepth details of all aspects of epilepsy the lovely descriptions of the house and surroundings made up for it.



What does it mean?: It was Peter who stood up and spoke to the shocked crowd that had gathered, preaching the Good News that "..everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." He called the witnesses in the crowd to repent and be baptised: about 3000 did so and became Christians on that day.

Christians believe that Pentecost, when the disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit, was the birth of the Christian church. We too can repent and be baptised and come into



the Christian faith, enjoying the peace, the blessing and the joy of being filled with the Holy Spirit. You can read the story in full in the Bible or online on the BibleGateway website and if you're interested in experiencing the Holy Spirit yourself, come along to a service! # News from Buckinghamshire Council

Dear Resident

I hope you are all keeping well. The weather continues to be a mixture of sunshine and showers but hopefully we have some better weather ahead.

I'm sure the national news this week cannot have escaped your notice with the announcement from the Prime Minister that there is to be a General Election on Thursday 4 July. Please do look out for further



information in the coming days and weeks about the deadlines for registering to vote, postal voting and voter ID.

On to more local matters, and I'm conscious it's been some time since my last update to you. I do therefore want to update you on some of the important items of local news and activity from the council in the last few weeks, and some information about what we've got coming up.

### Extra funding for additional drain and ditch clearing

I feel like I've spent most of these updates talking about the weather in recent months, and this is no exception! While it's a relief to finally be well into spring, we are still dealing with the impacts of one of the wettest periods in history. Even this week showed us once again that groundwater levels remain very high and that it only takes a heavy downpour to once again fill drains and gullies.

Locally we have had some more flood alerts. I know it's been an immensely difficult winter for some residents who've experienced the impacts of all this rain and flooding. We want to do everything we can to become more resilient to the impacts of prolonged wet weather, and I would advise starting by familiarising yourself with the wealth of information about flooding and flood prevention that's on the council's website.

The council is what is called a Local Lead Flood Authority. In practice, a lot of the responsibility lies with water companies and the Environment Agency but of course the council has a role in bringing these parties together, gathering local information, ensuring our own networks are fit for purpose and above all else, acting on behalf

This is why we have pledged a further £500,000 towards extra drain and ditch clearing – on top of the existing commitment to cleanse every gully in Buckinghamshire, every year. This additional funding will be spent on extra cleansing for more than 2,000 high priority ditches and drains, creating new ditching in some problem areas and repairing damaged drainage systems so the water can flow away more easily.

I want to make a special mention too of the severe impact that the heavy rainfall has had on the Chalfont St Peter area. I recently attended a packed meeting of concerned residents. This is in a location vulnerable to groundwater flooding but we have seen this winter the sewage system again compromised and residents having to experience the terrible situation of sewage flooding in homes and gardens. We have put pressure upon Thames Water, who own the sewage infrastructure, to firstly resolve this situation and to work on resilience and prevention. As an immediate priority we have pushed Thames Water to reopen the High Street and this was finally done this week. We thank residents for their patience.

### Road network

I was out and about over the weekend in my car and on my bicycle. It was good to see at last substantial road repairs. These have been very difficult due to the intermittent rain disrupting road works. We continue to work tirelessly to repair the damage caused by the wet winter to the whole of the road network. Again, the rain opened up multiple defects across the whole county and we know it's an uphill battle to get back on top of it. It is genuinely hard for councils across the country to keep up with the deterioration of their road networks and we are no exception. We fixed 30,000 potholes last year and I think we will do more this year.

We know what a key priority this is for our residents, which is why, as I've previously outlined, we've added an extra £5 million to the existing £105 million, meaning a total £110 million investment in the highways network over a four year period. Like last year, our aim is to capitalise on the spring and summer months and make big strides forward on our overall roads and repairs programme. This work also sees specific repairs and improvements to key pieces of infrastructure.

Let me just add that I am not complacent, and I know that we still have a lot to do on our roads with the limited financial resources available.

### **Marlow Bridge**


We're surveying Marlow Bridge at the moment to finalise the programme of works for this historic structure. And I'm delighted that we are reopening Berry Hill footbridge in Taplow in the coming weeks, after major works has left it closed for a very long time. This has been a complex project requiring a substantial section of the bridge being completely replaced and we are all very pleased this large-scale project is complete and that the bridge will be fully reopen to the public very soon.

### Extra funding for weed spraying

I know how important it is to our residents that the county and our villages and market towns are well presented. We've taken a really tough stance on fly-tipping

and littering and are ramping up even further our action on that, being early adopters of new powers available to us on enforcement against litter louts. I hope to say more about that in my next Newsletter.

Last year we made what frankly was, in retrospect, a mistake in removing the budget for weed spraying. This was on cost and safety grounds. I'm therefore really pleased that we have been able to re-instate a weed spraying round this year. The wet and mild weather has caused the weeds to grow extremely quickly this spring.

### **Roadside verges**

In recent years we have reduced the number of cuts to roadside verges. Again, this is for both financial but also environmental reasons. We have tried to improve the biodiversity of our roadsides. However, I am also very conscious of the balance we need to strike between protecting the natural environment but also keeping verges at junctions cut so they don't jeopardise visibility. The mixture of rain and sun has caused a lot of verges to grow very rapidly and some sight lines at junctions risk being obscured. If this occurs in your area please alert the council using Fix My Street or contact your locally elected Buckinghamshire Councillor.

### Reflections on the last year in Buckinghamshire



We recently held the council's Annual General Meeting, where we appointed our new Chairman, Cllr Mimi Harker OBE and new Vice Chairman, Cllr Sarfaraz Kahn Raji. The AGM is also a time where we take stock of where the council is now, what we've delivered over the last year, and what the immediate priorities are moving forward.

It has not been an easy year. I know many residents have relied on the ongoing support provided through our Helping Hand service and that many households have continued to feel the effects of rise in bills and other costs that we've seen in the last couple of years. As a council, balancing our own budgets has been exceptionally challenging given that

increased demand of four critical services; social care for children and adults, temporary accommodation for the homeless, and transport for children with special needs to get to school is devouring our budget and now accounts for 71% of our overall spend.

These are not easy parameters to work within and we are having to find further savings on top of the  $\pounds75$  million we've already saved through becoming a unitary council in Buckinghamshire.

That said, we remain prudently run and as a result are able to invest in community facilities in a way that sadly, some other local authorities are unable to do.

The council's activity over the last twelve months reflects its four over-arching priorities as agreed in our Corporate Plan; Strengthening our Communities, Protecting the Vulnerable, Improving our Environment and Increasing Prosperity.

I addressed the AGM on our Annual Report, which you can view at this link if you would like to see the detail, pulling out many of the main achievements we've delivered in the last year under these four themes which all of our work sits under

Some key highlights from the last 12 months include:

- The major extra investment in our road network as detailed above.
- Nearly £1 million invested in significant upgrades to seven parks and play spaces.
- Introducing higher fines and new zero tolerance policies for fly-tipping, with the same tougher approach coming in for littering.
- Administering £2.4 million of Household Support Fund through our Helping Hand programme, supporting residents experiencing financial hardship and handing out nearly 90,000 digital food vouchers for families to use during the school holidays.
- Progressing a number of projects under our flagship 'Opportunity Bucks' programme, our local approach to 'Levelling Up', which has included a series of Community Action Days and jobs and skills fairs.
- Our Adult Social Care team managing more than 40,000 contacts and completed nearly 4,000 reviews for social care clients.
- Our familiy support service supporting nearly 4,500 familes.
- Children in our schools continuing to achieve above average exam results.

### Future growth in our town centres and beyond

Importantly, we are also working hard to create a firm foundation for future growth here in Buckinghamshire. This is shown through the adoption of our Regenerating Bucks strategy last year. A key focus of this work is how we will regenerate our three largest town centres and I'm delighted that we've recently progressed exciting plans for Aylesbury that will deliver economic growth and create a more attractive town centre space.

We have progressed long-standing plans to turn the Old County Offices site into 46 brand new homes in the heart of the town, through a developer who will bring the scheme forward. We have also agreed proposals to regenerate the former Gala Bingo site on the High Street which has lain empty for a number of years. We have spent a lot of time exploring potential uses for this building including bringing it back into use. I know there is great affection for it and I myself, as a historian, had been very keen that we explored every possible option to retain the building. However, the reality is that this simply is not viable.

No business case has ever come forward and the building has sadly almost nothing left of its original cinema interior character. The costs of restoring it would be very high and more than the council can afford. Instead, the site offers a real opportunity to drive forward some very positive growth and change. We have therefore agreed exciting plans to create a new public space that will open up the High Street, creating a link to the thriving Exchange development. In essence, it will be a new

'quarter' for Aylesbury and the intention will be to have some retail and an outdoor space that can be used for music and other events, bringing people together in the same way that the Gala Bingo and old cinema did before it. Crucially, these plans will create new employment opportunities and will support our local independent businesses to flourish and grow. I will keep you updated as these plans progress.

I'm sorry that this Newsletter is so long. There has been much to update you on so I hope this has been useful and informative. I will leave you with a final thought about 'the future' – on far more personal level. As a council, we are trying hard to encourage as many people as possible to consider whether they could foster a child in need. We have seen a significant drop in the number of foster carers in Buckinghamshire in recent years yet fostering remains by far the best solution for a child in need. We have therefore worked hard to put together a really attractive package of 'perks' for foster carers in the hope of encouraging more to come forward. This includes a **full council tax refund**, **free parking in council car parks**, **free access to leisure centres** and more.
